Dear Friends,

I just spoke with a man named John who is one of our volunteers at Covenant House. John is the father of 7 children, who are grown now with their own families and children. John is also recently retired (he looks too young and healthy to be retired), and now with his free time, John comes to volunteer helping homeless kids. Often John comes early and sits to listen to the youth talk about their lives and to join them in their prayers in the chapel, then he spends most of the day sitting in front of a computer logging in information, even bringing a lunchbox so as not to waste any time. Last week John found out that he has lung cancer, though he had never smoked a day in his life, no family history, no poor work environment. A complete mystery. Over the weekend all of John's family came to see him, one a lawyer living in Indiana, another a businessman in California. One of John's daughters, who had been

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depressed for a long time, has become a new person, organizing all her siblings to help their father. The high-power lawyer took off from work: "I just have to be with you Dad," he said. John is hunched over his computer as I am writing this, his breathing is a little labored and he coughs from time to time. He goes on Holy Thursday to see about treatment. "I can't believe how this has brought my family together," John said. He went on, quietly, with a sense of wonder in his eyes: "What a gift this has been! Këtë muaj po japim një pjesë për shërbesat kishtare Orthodoxke dhe një pjesë nga parathënia e librit "Shqiptarët" i Edwin E. Jacques.

...Lutja liturgjike kishtare nuk është thjesht lutja e individëve të krishterë të bashkuar në një, nuk është një "shërbesë lutjeje" e shumë njerzve së bashku, por është lutja zyrtare e Kishës e mbledhur zyrtarisht. Shërbesat zyrtare të Kishës Orthodoxke janë zakonisht më të gjata se në kishat e tjera. Kjo ndodh, sepse ne shkojmë në Kishë jo vetëm thjesht për t'u lutur.

Ne shkojmë në Kishë të jemi së bashku, të këndojmë së bashku, të meditojmë së bashku mbi kuptimin e besimit, të mësojmë së bashku dhe të kemi bashkim e Kungim së bashku me Perëndinë. Shërbesat e Kishës nuk janë berë për lutjen e heshtur. Ato janë për miqësinë plot lutje të gjithë popullit të Perëndisë me njeri tjetrin, me Krishtin dhe me Perëndinë. "Emri i Zotit qoftë i bekuar, që tani e gjer në jetë të jetëve".

....Shqiptarët kanë jetuar në një vënd horizontesh të dhembëzuar, majash të larta, shkëmbinjsh të thikët, rrafshnaltash erërrahura dhe grykash plot me borë. Ata nuk e quajtën atë "Albania", por "Shqipëria", "Toka e Shqiponjës". Ata nuk e quajtën veten "Albanians", por "shqiptare", ose "Bij të Shqiponjës". Kështu, ata u identifikuan me më fisnikun prej shpendve, që fluturon më lart, që çiftohet përjetë dhe që e bën çerdhen ndër maja mbi dy mijë metra të larta. Kjo tokë piktoreske është përmendur në letërsi me konsideratë. Megjithëse Uilliam Shekspiri kurrë nuk e ka vizituar këtë vend, ai e vendosi komedinë e tij "Nata e Dymbëdhjetë" në Iliri, pra në Shqipëri. Vizitat që bëri Lordi Bajron në Shqipëri e lanë atë kaq entuziast për vendin dhe popullin, sa miku i tij poet, Shelli, i vuri nofken "Alby". Në Çajld Haroldin, Bajroni e shprehu admirimin e tij për "luginat e Ilirisë", për "malet e shumta sublime", për ato "toka të rralla dhe për përrallat e lashta", dhe shpalli "të tilla gryka të bukura rrallëherë t'i sheh syri".

Dear Friends,

In this season of renewed joy, I would like to take the opportunity again to thank so many of you for your aid, assistance, advice, and genuine labors. Lent is not an easy time with its expectations of spiritual abundance and material scarcity. Life does not give us a break—and for this, too, we should be thankful. The appointments we must keep, the job that does not let us rest, the harried pace of parents cum chauffeurs, all of this is a blessing reminding us that our ascetic endeavors, our so-called "spiritual lives", are nothing but vainglory when rent from our real lives of toil and conflict and great joy. So, to all of you who came to even one Lenten service, to all who sang or chanted or read, and to all who even intended sometime in there to be present: thank you for your intentions, thank you for your devotion, thank you for your thoughts and prayers.

Great and Holy Pascha is not a day; it is a foretaste of the day without end, when we will stand together for all time with all those we love singing to the one who is Love. In the Church, Pascha is a season—as Lent led us to this day, this season leads us through this day. Part of the festivities this year for this season at St. Nicholas Albanian Orthodox Church will be a retreat and workshop on the Sunday after Holy Pascha.

Now, when our bellies are full again, we have an opportunity to use the energy instilled in us by our resumed heavier diets for a good purpose. If you would like to serve in the altar (young or old), if you would like to hear more readings in Albanian (or simply are sick of hearing my voice each week), if you would like to join the choir, if you just want to know more about these things (but are afraid yet to commit), now is the time! May fourth, Thomas Sunday, we will share a meal, then we will share some time together learning. Remember, Thomas doubted and Christ revealed Himself to him. If you doubt your own abilities don't be surprised if there is a revelation for you, too.

Some friends of mine, the Rev. Deacon Nicholas Garklavs and his wife Charlene, have happily agreed to assist us that day. They will join us for Liturgy, and I trust that you will show them true Albanian hospitality afterward at the meal. We will then spend some time breaking into small groups and learning about those things which interest us and to which we might have a calling. Finally, if there is time, we may have an opportunity to demonstrate some of our new talents to our friends and peers.

Come one, come all, come old and young—May fourth and bring some festal food! Your church needs you.

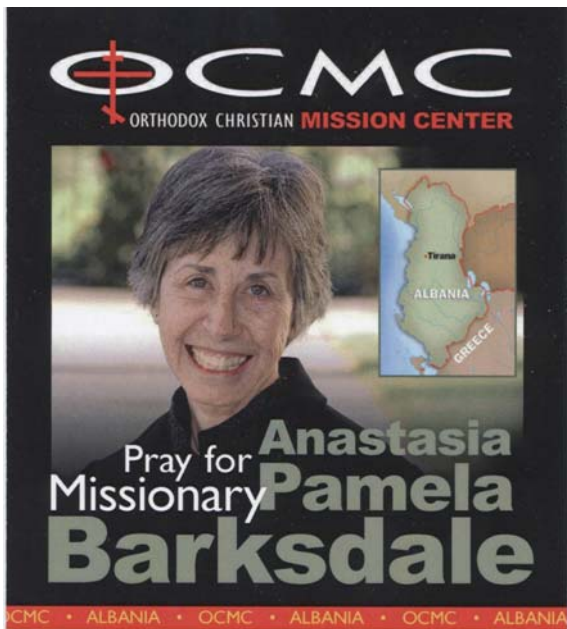
Dear Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

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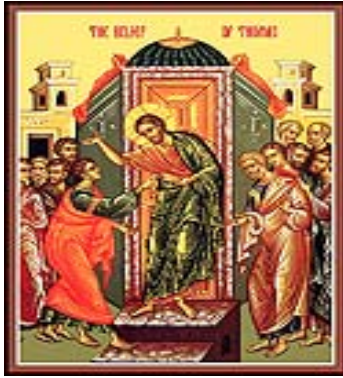

This Month's Major Feast Days

Antipascha – St. Thomas Sunday

2nd Sunday of Pascha

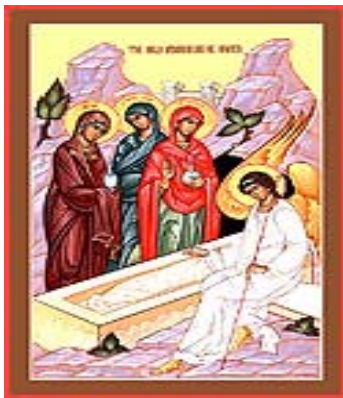
Commemorated on May 4



Some icons depicting this event are inscribed "The Doubting Thomas." This is incorrect. In Greek, the inscription reads, "The Touching of Thomas." The Slavonic inscription is, "The Belief of Thomas." When St Thomas touched the Life-giving side of the Lord, he no longer had any doubts. This day is also known as "Antipascha." This does not mean "opposed to Pascha," but "in place of Pascha." Beginning with this first Sunday after Pascha, the Church dedicates every Sunday of the year to the Lord's Resurrection. Sunday is called "Resurrection" in Russian, and "the Lord's Day" in Greek.

Sunday of the Holy Myrrhbearing Women with the Noble Joseph

3rd Sunday of Pascha - Commemorated on May 11



Today we commemorate the Holy Myrrh-bearing women Sts Mary Magdalene (July 22), Mary the wife of Clopas, Joanna (June 27), Salome, mother of the sons of Zebedee (August 3), Martha and Mary, sisters of Lazarus (June 4). Also St Joseph of Arimathea (July 31), and Nicodemus.

Sunday of the Paralytic

4th Sunday of Pascha - Commemorated on May 18



On this day the Church remembers the man who lay by the Sheep's Pool in Jerusalem for thirty-eight years, waiting for someone to put him into the pool. The first one to enter the pool after an angel troubled the water would be healed of his infirmities, but someone always entered the pool before him. Seeing the man, the Lord felt compassion for him and healed him.

The Kontakion for this Fourth Sunday of Pascha asks Christ to raise up our souls, "paralyzed by sins and thoughtless acts."

Sunday of the Samaritan Woman

5th Sunday of Pascha - Commemorated on May 25



During the time of the emperor Nero (54-68), who displayed excessive cruelty against Christians, St Photina lived in Carthage with her younger son Joses and fearlessly preached the Gospel there. At Rome the emperor ordered the saints to be brought before him and he asked them whether they truly believed in Christ. All the confessors refused to renounce the Savior. Then the emperor gave orders to smash the martyrs' finger joints. During the torments, the confessors felt no pain, and their hands remained unharmed.

Nero ordered that Sts Sebastian, Photinus and Joses be blinded and locked up in prison, and St Photina and her five sisters were sent to the imperial court under the supervision of Nero's daughter Domnina. St Photina converted both Domnina and all her servants to Christ. She also converted a sorcerer, who had brought her poisoned food to kill her.

Three years passed, and Nero sent to the prison for one of his servants, who had been locked up. The messengers reported to him that Sts Sebastian, Photinus and Joses, who had been blinded, had completely recovered, and that people were visiting them to hear their preaching, and indeed the whole prison had been transformed into a bright and fragrant place where God was glorified. Nero then gave orders to crucify the saints, and to beat their naked bodies with straps. On the fourth day the emperor sent servants to see whether the martyrs were still alive. But, approaching the place of the tortures, the servants fell blind. An angel of the Lord freed the martyrs from their crosses and healed them. The saints took pity on the blinded servants, and restored their sight by their prayers to the Lord. Those who were healed came to believe in Christ and were soon baptized.

Nero had her brought to him and asked if she would now relent and offer sacrifice to the idols. St Photina spit in the face of the emperor, and laughing at him, said, "O most impious of the blind, you profligate and stupid man! Do you think me so deluded that I would consent to renounce my Lord Christ and instead offer sacrifice to idols as blind as you?" Hearing such words, Nero gave orders to again throw the martyr down the well, where she surrendered her soul to God (ca. 66).
