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Pastor's Message

I have to hold my tongue pretty often. In diverse places and confronted with diverse subjects, there is an expectation of diplomacy from your priest, that discretion not to say things that might alienate or make some feel as though the doors of the Church might close against them. I have sometimes regretted these silences but mostly do not, for what remains unspoken—those necessary challenges, corrections, and redirections—can usually be saved and deferred for a better time and more fitting place. Now is one of those times.

Pretty often someone states that the goal of religion, all religions, is to make us good people; pretty often this someone intoning these words looks at me piously as though I must, of course, agree; pretty often I do. But I don't like to, and this dislike is more than personal perversity of spirit or hot-air contentiousness. I don't like this statement that our faith's goal is to make us good people because, for almost all of us, the goodness to which we aspire is not good. It's not wrong, nor is it that we have purposed ourselves to goals too low. No, our goodness is not good because it cannot be anything else than <u>our</u> goodness. It is not God's. And our goodness, at best, reaps some changes in this world of which we can be proud, and our goodness, at worst, leads us to be

LENT - A TIME TO TURN, TURN, TURN

Now as we enter closer to the beginning of Lent I thought about the song TURN, TURN, TURN by the rock group, The Byrds, made popular in 1965. The lyrics I feel are fitting and present a message for the season we are about to enter.

Pascha is the season we are called upon by the Church to repent which means to change, to look at our lives and TURN away from those things that keep us from having a relationship with Christ. To paraphrase a few of those lyrics:

To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven:

A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, a time to reap that which is planted;

A time to kill, and a time to heal, a time to break down, and a time to build up;

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reprehensible. Even students with but little and brief exposure to history know that yesterday's virtues so often require today apologies, restitution, and making right after having made things very wrong. There is that infamous road nicely tiled and paved with our best of intentions; we all know where it is supposed to lead.

Our Christian faith never had as its goal the production of good people. Our faith, instead, aims to mold us into Christian people, and this is something both simpler and yet more challenging. 
It is very important to remember that on the day you are scheduled for coffee, <u>please arrive at church by 10 a.m.</u> so that preparations can be made.

standard to which we must chart our lives and choices, then we have begun to tread the path of faith. For Christians, goodness does not reside in our ideals but in our proximity to Christ. This is why our faith cherishes that God Who is known not in rules and laws, not in checklists of shalls and shall nots, and certainly not in striving to win the fickle popularity contest of social respectability. No, God has made Himself known to us in story and in person. Christ and His work and the scandal of His life's work are not peripheral elements but at the very core of our faith. Were Jesus simply a nice enough guy, reckoned a good person by His own age's standards, the story of His ministry would have been quite different, but it would have been no gospel, no good news that renews. Ours is a scandalous faith because it calls us to no other virtue than being with and being like Christ our God.

How then do we begin to change, to shift from being mere good people to being people on the way to God and His life, His call, and His kingdom? This is a fitting question now pausing in these days just before one more year's Great and Holy Fast, one more year's journey to Pascha, that Great and Holiest Feast. In these coming weeks, we will make our way through an extended meditation on this very theme: growing to be with God. Not surprisingly, there is an education process built into our hymns and prayers so that their words with which we become so familiar begin to mean more to us, to rise in our minds, and to guide. Also, it should come as no surprise to any that trying to be with God requires time just like any other relationship. In Lent, we are expected to give more of this, and I use that word intentionally for this increase of dedication and attendance is not a suggestion nor proposal, it is an expectation; that's how our faith instructs us that this season works. We need to be removed from our own thoughts, recalled away from striving after our own goodness, and immersed into life with Christ, a sometimes harsh reality but one always tempered with that joy and peace that are part of our promised inheritance as children of God. So make a commitment this Lent to aim higher than being a good person. Aim to be a Christian.



1ST SATURDAY OF GREAT LENT; ST. THEODORE -Commemorated on March 19th

Today we remember the miracle of St Theodore and the boiled wheat. Fifty years after the death of St Theodore, the emperor Julian the Apostate (361-363), wanting to commit an outrage upon the Christians during the first week of Great Lent, commanded the city-commander of Constantinople to sprinkle all the food provisions in the marketplaces with the blood offered to idols. St Theodore appeared in a dream to Archbishop Eudoxius, ordering him to inform all the Christians that no one should buy anything at the marketplaces, but rather to eat cooked wheat with honey (kolyva).

In memory of this occurrence, the Orthodox Church annually celebrates the holy Great Martyr Theodore the Recruit on the first Saturday of Great Lent. On Friday evening, at the Divine Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts following the prayer at the ambo, the Canon to the holy Great Martyr Theodore, composed by St John of Damascus, is sung. After this, kolyva is blessed and distributed to the faithful. The celebration of the Great Martyr Theodore on the first Saturday of Great Lent was set by the Patriarch Nectarius of Constantinople (381-397).

The Troparion to St Theodore is quite similar to the Troparion for the Prophet Daniel and the Three Holy Youths (December 17, Sunday Before Nativity). The Kontakion to St Theodore, who suffered martyrdom by fire, reminds us that he also had faith as his breastplate (see I Thessalonians 5:8).

Saint Theodore the Recruit is also commemorated on February 17.






